Bill Erikson HF Challenge

I always say it's never too late to get in on the fun of the HF Challenge, and that is true, but getting started in January gives you more opportunities to enjoy the camaraderie for as long as possible! The 2015 Bill Erickson HF Challenge is now underway!

"There are two ways to work the Challenge, depending on how much time you can allot to amateur radio," wrote Challenge Administrator Joe Dubeck NA9A. Those with limited time can opt to spread it out over the entire year, with the goal of working as many different states, provinces and DX entities as possible. Those with more time can work the Challenge twice, giving them an opportunity to work each state, province and DX entity twice – once between January and June, and a second time from July through December.

"The Challenge's purpose is to be an incentive to get us the air more often," Joe wrote.

You should have received a copy of the 2015 Challenge worksheet by now. If you didn't, be sure to see Joe at the upcoming meeting to request a copy.

Those who worked the Challenge in 2014 should turn their worksheets in to Joe at the January meeting. You may also mail them to him at P.O. Box 1383, St. Charles, IL 60174-7383. However, be sure to let Joe know your worksheet is on the way. Deadline is Jan. 13th. As always, results of last year's Challenge will be announced at our annual awards banquet later this month.

Following is a summary of how the Challenge works, for the benefit of those who are new to the event. If you haven't worked the Challenge lately, or if you're new to the club or HF operation, you are strongly encouraged to get involved!

The Goal: To contact as many of the states, provinces and DX entities as possible from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 2015. If you work the Challenge straight through the year, you can report one contact for each state, province and DX entity. If you work the Challenge as two parts (January through June and July through December), you can record two contacts with the same station or with two different stations in each state, province or country.

The Categories: Participants may enter the challenge in the following classes.

LIMITED CLASS is a niche for those who choose to operate within selected limitations, including CW only, QRP (5 watts or less), digital mode, or single band.

OPERATOR CLASS is for those making contacts with 250 watts of power or less, in any mode.

QRO CLASS is for those using any mode with any legal power output.

RAG CHEWER CLASS only counts contacts that last at least 10 minutes, in any mode.

The Operation: The purpose of the Bill Erickson HF Challenge is to stimulate operating activity. The main requirement, of course, is that you get on the air. Resources are in the works to help those who need a hand in order to do that. If you need help configuring your station or aren't yet sure how to go about calling CQ or working a pile-up, watch for articles, operating events and mentoring opportunities to help you get started.

Bill Erikson HF Challenge (cont'd)

The Reporting: Presumably, everyone has a logging program with which they are comfortable; from your log, record your HF contacts on the Challenge reporting sheet on a regular basis. The worksheet will be mailed to Joe next January. (From personal experience, I can assure you it is far easier to update your worksheet each week or month than to do so all at once on Jan. 1st!)

The ArcOver: Part of the fun is seeing how other participants are doing throughout the year, so operators are encouraged to submit their total scores via email to challenge [at] frrl.org by the 15th of each month.

Be sure your email includes your name and call, the class in which you are operating, and the total number each of states, provinces, and DX entities contacted. If you are also working the Rag Chewer Class, the total number of state, province, and DX rag chews should be reported.

The Results: More on-air activity! Joe emphasizes that the Challenge isn't a contest in the usual sense. Although a little friendly competition makes it more fun, the real purpose of this activity is to provide a framework within which to operate, so that more of us will get on the air more often and exercise the operating privileges we worked so hard to earn!

"In any class, just one contact on any HF band, in any mode, means you met the challenge," Joe wrote in the worksheet, "and you'll receive a beautiful certificate documenting your achievement."

Everyone who participates in the HF Challenge will be acknowledged and receive their certificates during the FRRL annual awards banquet in January.

(You'll have an opportunity to do so during the January meeting!)

As you think about the horizons you might like to broaden, I encourage you to recall what brought you to radio in the first place. Because the world of radio has evolved so rapidly, the way you invest yourself in the hobby probably looks a lot different than it did when you received your first ticket. Reexamining the practices that first attracted you to amateur radio could provide a great deal of enjoyment. I, for example, was initially intrigued with contesting – the chatter of voices from around the world, the challenge of zeroing in on a single station in what sounded to me like a bee hive, the fast pace and excitement, were the impetus that led me to begin this journey and earn my first license. Jeff and I used to build our schedules and manage our lives around the contests we wanted to work! While current obligations make it difficult to be quite as immersed as I once was, I do believe it would be worth the effort to reclaim a small part of that piece of the past in the coming year.

What about you? What part of the hobby once made your heart sing, and pulled you so strongly that you couldn't wait to get back to it? Program Speaker

Carl Luetzelschwab K9LA was licensed in 1961 (WN9AVT), and enjoys propagation, DXing, contesting, playing with antennas, and working on and using vintage equipment. Carl is a graduate of Purdue University, and retired in October 2013. He was an RF design engineer for Motorola and Raytheon (formerly Magnavox).

Carl's presentation is two-fold. First, he will give an update on Solar Cycle 24 and he will review the early predictions for Cycle 25, including a discussion of the possibility of entering another Maunder Minimum.

Second, he will review the historical contributions by Amateur Radio operators to the science of radio. He will then tie this into ways to bring youth into Amateur Radio to turn around the ever-increasing average age of those in our hobby and to invigorate clubs.
